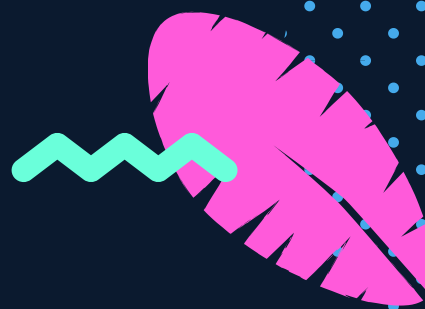

Summer Vacation

I remember the excitement of that upcoming summer vacation when I was young. I couldn't wait to play with my friends or have a fabulous time at camp. I loved waking up late and catching a half price matinee blockbuster on a weekday or going to the comic bookstore whenever I wanted. Yes, I love to look back at those wonderful days when I was only 24.

As a fourth-grade teacher, I would actually finish clearing out my classroom and then head off to camp only a week or two later. Yet, I always understood that the summer would end, and I would report back to the classroom in late July which, timing wise, I'm sure, feels fairly bizarre to those of you who became accustomed to returning to school after Labor Day.

Many believe the origins of "summer vacation" stem from our time as an agricultural society when parents obligated their children to help plant or harvest their fields during a few weeks in the fall and spring. Later in the 19th century, the idea that children required time to play to help both rest and invigorate their growing minds became a systemic belief in our culture, and thus the summer vacation came to be an assumed part of our world.

The tradition of summer vacation eerily mimics our own Jewish vision on how to raise children. First, the book of Deuteronomy clearly states, "Parents are responsible for educating their children," and secondly, Judaism morphed from an agricultural religion to one which stretched far

and wide into every sphere of influence. Thirdly, parenting remains a balance between two core values, as Bradley Artson, a professor at the Conservative Rabbinical School in L.A. writes, "Human parenting is a combination of two core

Jewish values: chesed [compassion] and din [justice]. The first opens up new horizons, teaching children that they can be self-surpassing, showing them that they can break through and do things they never thought possible, thereby giving them the courage to risk doing things they've never tried before. The second is to provide appropriate boundaries: those areas we never

transgress, lines we never cross."

Judaism has always taught us that we must send our children to school to learn, and we must give them time to explore, a careful balance met in different ways by every generation. Today, we educate them in classrooms religiously and secularly for nine to ten months, and we educate them in less structured ways in the summer.

So, as the first week of August begins, we want to welcome back to class all of our students. We hope you had a wonderful summer of exploratory education, and we welcome back all of our teachers, whom we have entrusted with the essential task of educating and inspiring our children in a classroom setting. We know you probably wanted maybe one more week of summer vacation, but we thank you for the extraordinary time and efforts you devote to the welfare of our community.

Friends or Family? Gray or Blue?

The Shapell Roster Project May Need YOU!!!

Many Mickve Israel congregants and other Savannah Jews have ancestors who fought in the War Between the States, some for the North and others for the South. Some we know of and others may still be waiting to be found on our family trees. Even though we may know their names, there is often research to be done to find out about their lives. My ancestors lived in the South. Like most Jewish Southerners, they fought in or supported the Confederate military. Below is some research on those of my family who fought in the Civil War, the War Between the States, or the "Late Unpleasantness".

My great-grandfather, Henry Coleman, enlisted in Wright's famous 3rd Georgia Infantry Regiment, in Wilkinson County, Georgia. He was severely wounded at Manassas Gap and was later captured at Petersburg, Virginia and held until after General Robert E. Lee surrendered. He engaged in many bloody battles during the War and was described as "a brave and gallant soldier".

Another great-grandfather, Isadore Lovenstein, enlisted in the 1st Virginia Infantry in Richmond and later transferred to the 12th Virginia, attaining the rank of sergeant. Isadore was detailed to the Medical Purveying Depot at Richmond for a period of time. He later received a severe head wound at Malvern Hill and was captured on the retreat to Appomattox. His service record stated that he, too, "proved a gallant soldier". Henry Coleman fought in the battle at Malvern Hill as well. The two had not met at that point and had no idea that Henry's son, Nathan, and Isadore's daughter, Jeanne, would meet, fall in love, and eventually become my grandparents.

Isadore Lovenstein's older brother, William, also enlisted at Richmond in the 3rd Virginia Light Infantry Blues and was later captured at Roanoke Island. He eventually attained the rank of 1st Sergeant. William was extremely intelligent and an excellent soldier but, according to his service record, was far too "fat" to be of much use on the battlefield. As a result he, too, was detailed to the Medical Purveying Depot at Richmond, where he served until he was mustered out about a year before the end of the War because of an ulcer on his leg.

Isadore's younger brother, Joseph Lovenstein, was a cadet at Virginia Military Institute and entered the War when he, too, enlisted in the 3rd Virginia Richmond Light Infantry Blues, following in the footsteps of his older brother, William. Joseph was later detailed to the Medical Purveying Depot at Richmond as well. Although records show that all three brothers were assigned to the Medical Depot at one time or another, there is no evidence that any of them were there at the same time. They should have been so lucky!

My great-great-uncle, Jacob Gardner, was living in Florida when the "minute men" of 1860 were organized, and he joined a company at Fernandina,

the Fernandina Volunteers. He was one of 25 men to take the steamer "Everglade" to St. Augustine to take possession of Ft. Marion. He helped remove part of the cannon ammunition from there to Fernandina. The Volunteers disbanded after a few months of service, with members scattering and joining other commands. After the capture of Fernandina, Jacob joined the 2nd Florida Cavalry, later transferring to Milton's Light Artillery, where he served until the close of the War. He was the company commissary agent and was well known for being able to scrounge and barter for food. Jacob was a prolific writer, and sent home numerous letters from the battlefield. Some are amusing - like the one giving his sister permission to knit him some socks because she was so worried about his feet. Others are quite horrific - such as the one describing Jacob's reaction to witnessing for the first time the court martial and execution of two Confederate traitors. What you see in the movies is

nothing compared to what he described in that letter.

Henry Coleman, Jacob Gardner, Isadore and Joseph Lovenstein eventually made their way to Savannah and worshiped with their families in our Temple until their respective deaths. Henry, Jacob, Isadore, and Joseph are buried in Savannah at Laurel Grove North. William is buried in Philadelphia.

The Shapell Roster Project is developing a comprehensive searchable database of Jewish soldiers and sailors who fought for the Union or the Confederacy. Thus far, this organization has added over 1000 Jewish Civil War sailors and soldiers to the previously used 1895 roster. (Coincidentally, the Shapell Roster indirectly provided some information for the research about my ancestors.) Shapell recently contacted Mickve Israel and other congregations to learn the names of any Jewish Civil War participants that congregants know about as well as any information about them that can be provided. Over the next few months, using the lists we already have that are digitally displayed in the Gutstein Museum as a beginning, we hope obtain the names and information about Jewish Civil War participants who either lived in Savannah during the War or who are ancestors of someone who now lives in Savannah, or even some we just know about. The info above about my ancestors is a sample, but no matter how much or little info you know, we hope to include those names and information to the Shapell Roster Project. This information will be available for future historians and genealogists doing research about Jewish participation in the Civil War. Watch in the e-news, "Contact", and perhaps the "Savannah Jewish News" for more information about this important and exciting project.

To learn more about our congregation's story as well as Savannah and American history, explore the Gutstein Museum, our sanctuary, and our Slany Torah exhibit.
