Antisemitism On The Rise

Adam Solender, Executive Director SJF/JEA, recently wrote an article about one of the fears that seems to be more far reaching than in many years. "Anti-semitism is not limited to one extreme and there is increased danger that it will seep into the mainstream from the far left and the far right. In this atmosphere, it is vitally important that we understand the urgency of better educating ourselves about the challenge and stepping up our fight." It's true that the numbers couldn't be clearer. Anti-Semitism is on the rise, and it's a problem we need to take very seriously. The famous rabbi, teacher, author, Deborah Lipstadt implores Jews and non-Jews alike to do everything in their power to combat this rise wherever and whenever possible.

She rightly fears more than simply the attacks, but so too the way in which these attacks affect the way in which we live our Judaism. In an article she recently wrote for the Atlantic entitled, "Jews are Going Underground," Lipstadt states, "When Jews feel it is safer for them to go 'underground' as Jews, something is terribly wrong—wrong for them and, even more so, wrong for the society in which they live. Jews have taken and are taking anti-Semitism very seriously. Non-Jews must do the same."

Anti-Semitism remains a blight on our world, ever reminding us of our vulnerabilities. Yet, this hate infestation signals a much larger problem. When people of any faith, race, gender, or belief system must hide their identity, what does this need to live underground say about the country in which they live? Lipstadt answers the question by adding in her article, "No healthy democracy can afford to tolerate anti-Semitism in its midst. It is one of the long-term signs of rot in that democracy."

The best way to combat such hate remains as ever to unite with others so as to combat it together. If only women speak out against gender inequality, we have already lost our way. If only African Americans speak out against racism, we

have already lost our way. If only Jews speak out against anti-Semitism, we have already lost our way.

That's why we support the struggle of all who live in such times. This is why we host a Tri-faith service, why Asbury Memorial just had a viewing of a movie about the shootings in Charleston, and why we band together whenever people find themselves facing such hatred. Let's continue to find ways to support ourselves and others against such contempt and bigotry.

A Note From The Parnas

Happy 2020 everyone! You may have heard some rumors about this year's Food Fest. Here is what the situation is concerning it's future. Over the years, the Food Fest has grown in size and scope. Now its current size, overall logistics and planning needed to make it a success have become an enormous undertaking and a stressful strain on the congregants and staff members. Having the Food Fest near the High Holidays makes it even more difficult. We need our congregants and staff to be able to focus their efforts fully on both Food Fest and the High Holidays and that is not possible with the current situation. There are also

more and more competing events occurring at the same time as Food Fest taking away from attendance.

The Board has approved moving Food Fest to a new date. We are looking at moving Food Fest to earlier in the year. (I know we are a Reform congregation, but we cannot move the High Holidays).

So this year, we are having Food Fest on October 25th, but it will be smaller and different because the next one will be soon afterwards. This will give us more resources to plan and execute the Festival and increase attendance with less competing events.

ESSEN ESSEN BY INA KULLER INDIAN LENTIL AND GARBANZO STEW

Ingredients

- 2 Tablespoons olive oil
- 1 medium onion, finely chopped
- 2 T. chopped, fresh ginger
- 2 teaspoons, (or to taste) commercial curry powder
- 1 teaspoon garam marsala
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 Tablespoons chopped garlic
- 1 32 oz. box of vegetable broth
- 1 1/2 LB uncooked, dried lentils, rinsed - half a package
- 1 jalapeno pepper, split lengthwise; seeds/ white membrane removed and discard
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 can garbanzo beans, drained
- 1 can coconut milk – full fat is best

Directions:

Heat olive oil in 4 -quart saucepan. Over medium heat, sweat onions and ginger until slightly translucent, about 5 minutes. Reduce heat, add garlic and spices stirring and scraping bottom of pot for 1 minute. Add broth and lentils, cover pot and bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer until lentils are almost tender, about 30 minutes. Add garbanzo beans, coconut milk and chili. Cover and simmer 20 minutes, stirring occasionally. Adjust for salt if necessary; remove chili halves and bay leaves. Serve with basmati rice.

This recipe will freeze.

Georgia Day Parade

The Georgia Day parade has been a beloved Savannah tradition for decades with over 3,000 local schoolchildren marching through the city's squares to commemorate the 1733 founding of the colony. For the first time, Mickve Israel will be an official participant in the parade, acting as a landmark along the route. Congregants are invited to come dressed up as historical figures from Savannah Jewish history and will stand along Bull St. as the costumed children pass by.

This idea arose from another, more recent tradition: in years past, Elderhostel participants would wave to the kids as a kind of impromptu audience. The kids loved the encouragement and the Elderhostel participants got a kick out of seeing the children in adorable costumes. We hope this

new endeavor will reinforce Mickve Israel as an icon in the minds of the city's students and remind them of the integral role the Jewish community plays in Savannah.

This year's parade theme is "Finding My Voice". Children will make their own banners to carry, and gather their own costumes, and we can do the same. Costumes befitting colonial characters like Dr. Nunes and Abigail Minus, 18th personas like Commodore Levi, and Civil War icons like the Levy sisters can be found on Amazon or at local costume shops like Acme Costume in Garden City. If you would like to be a part of the parade fun, join us Friday, February 21 at 10:30am near the Bull St. entrance. The parade begins in Forsyth Park at 10:45am. Judaism 101 Class Schedule



The registration form will now appear on your screen. Please fill out all the required information, then click 'Submit.'

STEP 3

A form asking for a verification number will now appear on your screen. Retrieve your verification number in your email or by text message. Enter the verification code and hit 'Submit.'

STEP 4

A payment page will then appear. Select your method of payment and complete the payment section. Once you have entered in your payment information click 'Submit.' The acceptable payment methods are: American Express, Visa, Mastercard, Discover, PayPal, Apple Pay, Google Pay, Debit Card, ACH/e-check, personal check (for paper ballots* only).
