A Festive Holiday

At some point, probably in the fourth century B.C.E., someone wrote down the story of Esther, and it became an instant sensation. The story of the survival of the Jewish people and of course, the colorful characters, made for a fabulous story. So much so, that when the Rabbis decided which books to codify into the Hebrew Bible, they included the Book of Esther, even though the word “God” remained absent from the book in its entirety. The great historian, Josephus, spoke of the book in “The Antiquities of the Jews,” and Rabbis from countless generations discussed the story and created very specific rules for the holiday in both the Mishna and the Talmud. Later generations would continue to devour the opportunity to celebrate the only truly “fun” holiday commemorated by the Jewish masses. Over a 2,500 year period, parties, spiels, hamantaschen, alcohol, Tzedakah, food, sarcasm, even male cross-dressing became the norm. Children loved dressing in costumes and adults enjoyed drinking alcohol while dressed in costumes. It seemed that nothing could stop the Purim Celebration train, and it would remain our most venerated of all the minor holidays for all time.



Of course, one holiday would though eventually rise from the ashes of anonymity to challenge Purim for supremacy in the category of “Fun” holiday. At first, Hanukkah seemed to be nothing more than a cheap pretender to the crown, but as the world changed, this holiday, based on two books which didn’t even merit inclusion in the Bible, wrestled the mantle from Purim to become the most joyous holiday on the Jewish calendar.

I know we all enjoy the festiveness of Hanukkah, but let us not forget Purim, the holiday originally created to ensure that we as Jews celebrate festively at least once a year. The story of Esther, Haman, Mordecai, and Achashverosh struck a vital chord in our ancestors, who often lived through times of dearth and struggle. So let’s continue to dress in costume, to eat hamantaschen, to jeer at the name of Haman, and to generally enjoy the fact that we live in a wonderful Jewish world these days.

We will be celebrating Purim this year on March 9th, and if anyone is interested in participating in the Spiel, please let me know, as we will repeat one of our favorite spiels this year....”A Very Muppet Purim.”

ESSEN ESSEN BY INA KULLER ITALIAN COUNTRY CHICKEN

Ingredients

1 whole chicken cut up, or parts of your choice
 2 Tablespoons, extra virgin olive oil
 1 medium onion
 1 red bell pepper, sliced thin
 1 small jar pitted kalamata olives, drained
 1 small jar julienned sun-dried tomatoes packed in oil, drained
 1- 8.5 oz. can artichoke hearts, water packed, drained, and cut in half
 4 garlic cloves, chopped fine
 2 T. fresh sage chopped
 2 bay leaves
 salt and pepper
 3 /4 cup chicken stock
 3 /4 cup dry white wine
 Kosher salt and black pepper

Directions:

Pat chicken dry with paper towel; season with salt and a generous amount of black pepper. Heat olive oil in Dutch oven and brown on both sides then transfer to a bowl. Remove all but a few T. of oil from the pan; add onions and peppers and sauté on medium heat until onions are slightly translucent; then add garlic for 30 seconds and stir. Add wine and allow to reduce for 1 minutes. Add back chicken along with reserved juices, sun-dried tomatoes, olives, sage, bay leaves, and wine and chicken stock. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes. Add artichoke hearts and continue to cook uncovered 15 minutes. Discard bay leaves, and place chicken on serving platter. You can reduce the sauce further at this point if you'd like, then pour over chicken.

Serve with penne pasta, garlic bread, orzo, or rice.

Ann and Julette met me at Second Harvest a week before and picked up our biggest order ever (4800 pounds), stored it at their warehouse, and finally schlepped and unloaded everything at the Trade Center. Dräger picked up the tab for this entire order.

Also thank you to Jennifer, Daren, Dennis, and Chris at CMI for schlepping some of the items that were not used to the United Way basement.

It was an exhausting but exhilarating and rewarding experience. Thank you everyone.

STEP 1

Go to: www.ZionistElection.org and click on the 'Register & Vote' button.

STEP 2

The registration form will now appear on your screen. Please fill out all the required information, then click 'Submit.'

STEP 3

A form asking for a verification number will now appear on your screen. Retrieve your verification number in your email or by text message. Enter the verification code and hit 'Submit.'

STEP 4

A payment page will then appear. Select your method of payment and complete the payment section. Once you have entered in your payment information click 'Submit.' The acceptable payment methods are: American Express, Visa, Mastercard, Discover, PayPal, Apple Pay, Google Pay, Debit Card, ACH/e-check, personal check (for paper ballots* only).

*Paper ballots are available at www.azm.org/elections.

STEP 5

You are now ready to vote for the Reform Slate!

You will be asked to provide your email address and a 'Voting PIN Code.' You can retrieve your 'Voting PIN Code' by text message or email. Enter the information and click 'Submit.'

Select the "Vote Reform: ARZA Representing the Reform Movement and Reconstructing Judaism" option! We will be listed 2nd on the ballot. Choose only one Slate. Click the 'Submit' button to confirm you are voting for the slate you want and click the 'Vote' button.
