The Return of Judaism 201 Delving More Deeply into Judaism

After the High Holy Days and the Shalom Y'all Food Festival is behind us, give your brain a bit of a workout by attending the three remaining sessions of CMI's Judaism 201 classes. Each session is self-contained so that you may attend all or only those sessions which interest you. All classes are on Tuesday evenings at the synagogue and begin at 6:30 and finish at 8:00pm. Please call the Temple and reserve a space because knowing how many will attend helps in having enough materials prepared. There is no charge for these classes.

Session 3 – Tuesday, October 29 – It's All in the Point of View" – Many of our liturgical prayers are said in translation, and the point of view of the translator impacts how it changes from the original Hebrew to English. We will look at translations of prayers from different siddurs and from different Jewish movements. We will take some time to compare and contrast the texts. You may be surprised to learn that some of our prayers have an

interesting backstory!

Session 4 – Tuesday, November 5 – "Dancing and Dressing in the Synagogue" – Movement. . . is it a part of Jewish prayer? We will examine the "choreography" of Jewish prayer and the synagogue service and the meaning behind it. We will discuss the age-old question: Do Jews kneel in prayer? We will also take a look at those items that we don for prayer and their significance.

Session 5 - Tuesday, November 12 – "Modern Israel" – The history of Israel and the Jewish people is long and rich, but this session will look at Israel since its founding as a nation in 1948. We will discuss the highs and lows of its 70 year history and take a look at the Israeli election system.

Ingredients

For the dough:

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 3 large eggs, beaten
- 3 Tbsp cold water, approximately

For the meat filling:

- 2 Tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 medium clove garlic, finely chopped
- 3 cups chopped, cooked beef (about 12 ounces – can be either ground beef or finely chopped leftover brisket or roast)
- 1 large egg
- 1 tsp paprika
- · salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

Kreplach: Jewish Dumplings You Can Make at Home

Directions

- 1. To make the dough: Place the flour, salt and beaten eggs in a food processor. Process while gradually adding just enough water to have the dough form into a ball. Wrap the dough in plastic wrap and let rest for at least one hour.
- 2. To make the filling: Heat the vegetable oil in a sauté pan over medium heat. Add the onion and garlic and cook, stirring frequently, for about 2-3 minutes, or until the vegetables have softened. Place the chopped meat in a bowl. Add the softened onion (and garlic), egg, paprika and salt and pepper to taste. Mix thoroughly.
- 3. Roll the dough, a portion at a time, on a floured surface until the dough is very thin (less than 1/8-inch). Cut dough into 2-1/2 to 3-inch squares.
- 4. Place one heaping teaspoon of filling in the center of each square. Fold the dough over the filling to make a triangle. Pinch the dough together to seal the edges (if necessary wet two sides of the square).
- 5. Bring a large soup pot of water to a boil. Cook the kreplach about a dozen at a time for about 15 minutes, or until they are tender.
- 6. To serve, place the cooked kreplach in chicken soup and cook for 4-5 minutes. You may also fry the kreplach in vegetable oil.

Talking to children about Teshuva

As a mother I struggled with the right way of teaching my children some of our values. This became especially true when the High Holidays came around and the sensitive subject of Teshuva, repentance, was up. This topic could easily turn into guilt if approached the wrong way. I wanted my child to embrace the opportunity rather than to fear it, so I looked for a process, a Repentance Plan my child could relate to, one that would help him recognize his mistakes and understand what went wrong. Digging into my own experience was a process that worked for me, so this is the one I presented. Take a good look in the mirror and ask yourself "what accomplishments am I most proud of? What mistakes have I made and what can I learn from these mistakes?"

Laid out in such a way, the process of recognizing a mistake seems to me more practical and manageable. Once my child was able to recognize wrongdoing, I wanted him to have the tools to come up with ideas to avoid repeating the mistake. "What do I want to do differently in the coming year?" was the next question I offered. The issue with this open-ended question is that it could easily call for lofty goals while the key to success is more often a succession of smaller, realistic goals. The message I had to pass on was to focus on small goals, no drastic changes: don't go from a chaotic playroom to a spotless and sanitized space. Let's agree to get used to picking up the Hotwheel cars every evening for a while,

and we'll add the Legos next week.

Now that I had something that looked like a Repentance Plan, the question was how to present it without falling into the pitfall of lecturing or patronizing? Like many parents, I had found that some subjects are better approached in three simple ways:

- Find a quiet time when I would get my child's full attention (bedtime or Shabbat morning worked the best for us)
- Use a non-confrontational tone
- Most importantly, making the narrative about myself and describing a situation where I was at fault (probably hard to imagine for my young progeny!).
 With that last step, my child understood that adults make mistakes too, so he was more likely to hear me out.

Teshuva, repentance, should not be overwhelming to children. It's all about getting into the habit of seeking self-improvement and taking small steps towards meaningful and reasonable goals. Jewish tradition teaches that the sounds of the shofar is a wake-up call, causing Jews around to world to review and rethink the past year. It could sound scary, but I hope that my plan made my child think of the shofar blast as an opportunity for a fresh start rather than something to fear.

Gutstein Museum Wins Another Award

We have recently been notified that Mickve Israel's Nancy and Lawrence Gutstein Museum is a recipient of an award from the Georgia Historical Records Advisory Council (GHRAC). This award, in the category of "Excellence in Archival Development Program a Local Historical Records Repository" is for the exhibit,



"Representations of Jews in Irish Literature and related programming," that Mickve Israel co-sponsored in March, 2018.

GHRAC, a branch of the Georgia Archives, supports efforts throughout the state to improve the condition of historical records and to promote the use of those documents for educational purposes. Programming,



related to the Jews in Irish Literature exhibit that Mickve Israel, Georgia Southern's Center for Irish Research and Teaching, and Atlanta's Irish Consulate General cosponsored, was scheduled throughout the month. The program, "The Children of Erin and Abraham: Irish-Jewish Connections in Savannah", used historic primary

resources throughout the presentations. Programs about Rabbi George Solomon and the historic connection of the Jewish and Irish communities included numerous long-buried documents and photos found in Mickve Israel's Archival Collection (housed at the Georgia Historical Society), and a Power Point illustrating a chronology of the two century relationship of the two communities (presented by Dr. Howard Keeley of Georgia Southern's Irish studies department), used photos, and articles from archival Savannah newspapers.

Congratulations to all who worked on this outstanding month-long project and for winning this GHRAC Award.

The award presentation will take place at the Georgia Archives in Morrow, GA (near Atlanta) on October 15.

This information will be available for future historians and genealogists doing research about Jewish participation in the Civil War. 
